Anli Lin Tong, born in Taiwan, was first recognized as a special talent at the age of nine. Her introduction to Polish pianist Mieczyslaw Munz, a faculty member of the Juilliard School and the Curtis Institute of Music, led to a scholarship to Juilliard, where the non-English speaking child became Munz's youngest pupil. She went on to receive a Bachelor and Master of Music in Piano Performance from Juilliard. Later studies included master classes at the Salzburg Mozarteum and doctoral studies on full scholarship at UCLA.

Ms. Tong's international concert performances have included the stages of such venues as the Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center, the Taipei Symphony Hall, the Bordeaux Opera House, and the Getty Center in Los Angeles. As a concerto soloist, she has appeared with the Taiwan Symphony Orchestra in the National Arts Festival, the Chinese Fine Arts Orchestra, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, the Bratislava Chamber Orchestra, the Livic Chamber Orchestra, and the Beach Cities Symphony.

Chair Named in Honor of Founder Elaine M. Hunter

The opening concert of our 62nd season will start with something new for the Beach Cities Symphony—the naming of a chair. Upon receiving a generous donation from Dr. Ken Hunter, son of Elaine M. Hunter, it was decided by board members that a fitting tribute to one of our founders would be the naming of the concertmaster's chair.

Elaine Hunter came to California in 1940 with her husband, Ken, and they settled in Redondo Beach. After three years they moved to Manhattan Beach. Elaine had played violin as a student at the University of Minnesota and wanted to play in a

local orchestra. Not finding what she wanted in the South Bay, she and a friend, Marie Swearingen, decided to search for a core group of musicians who would be willing to play in a newly-formed orchestra. Their first rehearsals and performances were at Redondo Union High School.

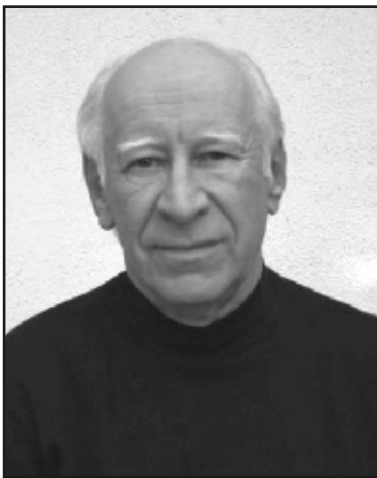

Jerome Kessler is a versatile musician who is active on the West Coast on the concert stage and in commercial music venues. He is the principal cellist of the Los Angeles Cello Quartet and is the founder and conductor of the cello octet *I Cellisti*. He appears widely as a soloist in chamber music and symphonic events and is prominent in the orchestras of Los Angeles television and motion picture studios. Mr. Kessler has performed under Pierre Boulez, and toured and recorded with Frank Zappa. He is well known to audiences and has concertized across the United States. He has recorded as soloist or conductor for Everest, Orion, Cambria and Arnaeus Records. He is a charter member of the American Symphony Orchestra under Leopold Stokowski, and he was a founding director of the Los Angeles Violoncello Society, appearing as soloist, chamber player, and conductor at American and International Cello Congresses. Mr. Kessler is Music Director and Conductor of the Topanga Symphony and a former Music Director of the Beach Cities Symphony. His activities as an instructor and clinician have included visiting assignments at numerous universities, as well as private teaching and coaching. He is also a frequent judge of solo, chamber music, and composition competitions.

Ms. Tong has been generous in giving of her time and talents to benefit many worthy causes, including raising funds for earthquake victims in Taiwan and a medical clinic in Mexico. The Beach Cities Symphony Association is grateful to have her on its board of directors where she has spearheaded the details for our BCSA Scholarship program.

The October concert marks Ms. Tong's fourth solo performance with the Beach Cities Symphony. For our opening concert in October, 2011, she will play a *Bartók* selection which has special meaning for her personally. The concerto was a birthday "gift of love" from a dying composer to his wife, a pianist, so that she could earn a living with its performance after his death. Five years ago, on the eve of the Beach Cities Symphony's opening concert, which featured violist Paul Coletti performing another *Bartók* concerto, Ms. Tong was working to prepare the young audience speakers when she was informed of the sudden death of her mother in Taiwan. Ms. Tong will dedicate her performance of *Bartók's* Concerto No. 3, the "gift of love," to the memory of her mother, Hsueh-Tseng Kao Lin.

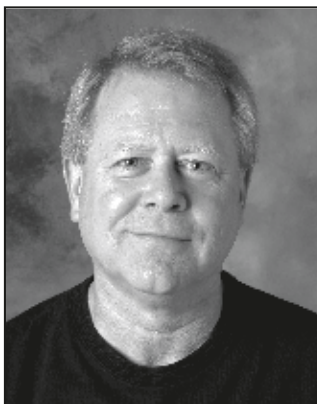

Andrew Malloy received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Massachusetts and his Master of Music Performance from The Juilliard School. After living and working in New York City, Mr. Malloy moved to Los Angeles and

established himself as a freelance musician. He performs regularly as a member of the Pasadena, Santa Barbara, and New West Symphonies and the Crown City Brass Quintet. He works with most of the leading musical organizations in the Los Angeles area, including the Los Angeles Philharmonic, LA Opera, Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, Long Beach Symphony, and Hollywood Bowl Orchestra. Out-of-town appearances include his long-time association with the San Luis Obispo Festival Mozaic; brass quintet performances in Austin, Texas; the Martha's Vineyard Chamber Music Festival; and guest artist at the Eastern Trombone Workshop in Washington, D.C., where he presented a solo recital and appeared as soloist with the U.S. Army Band (Pershing's Own). He teaches trombone at two universities and has an active private studio. Mr. Malloy has played on many film scores with some of Hollywood's most famous composers and has worked extensively in television. As a solo recitalist, he commissioned and premiered *Sonata for Trombone and Piano* by Stanley Friedman, *Fantasy* by Lincoln Hanks, and *Doseandeeze* by Jim Self. He has produced a solo album entitled *Best of Friends* and another soon-to-be released entitled *Paper Clips*.

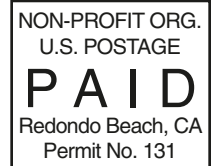

Son Ken has fond memories of rehearsals and performances, and especially of the cookies served after each performance—a tradition we have maintained for 62 years.

Elaine's family was always supportive of her tireless efforts to encourage musicians to join the growing orchestra and the growing audiences. Many past and present supporters and musicians had or have connections to the Hunter family. Ken's dad referred to the new orchestra as "Elaine's Silly Symphony," but he attended all the performances and shared her enthusiasm. The orchestra numbered about 20 musicians; not a bad feat when one considers the meager population of the South Bay in 1949.

Charter orchestra member Bob Peterson remem-

bers Elaine very well. She convinced him to become a home owner rather than a renter after she became a realtor. He remembers how Elaine talked about the orchestra to everyone she met, invited them to attend the concerts, and then urged them to become members of the Association.

"Elaine's Silly Symphony" has evolved in 62 years to 85 members and audiences of 800 to 1,000. Elaine's enthusiasm and belief that the Beach Cities Symphony had a viable mission for eternity was obviously passed on to her family members, who continue to be supporters even though some of them no longer live in the South Bay. If she were to sit in the orchestra today, she would be proud of what she helped create—and she would also be proud of her family who continues to support her dream.
